

Nancy Miorelli knows all about bees. She is an entomologist. An **entomologist** is a person who studies insects. Ms. Miorelli says that most people like honeybees. Honeybees help on farms. They carry pollen from one plant to another. This is called **pollination**. Pollination helps plants grow the fruit, nuts, and vegetables we eat.

she says. When they do, they are protecting themselves. Moving slowly and carefully around bees can help you avoid a sting.

Most wild bees live in nests on the ground or in dead trees. They pollinate wild plants and some farm crops. Many people are worried about wild bees having enough food and places to live.

How can you help? "Do not pick wildflowers you find," says Ms. Miorelli. "You can plant a wildflower garden."



Most wild bees do not harm people. They are helpful in nature. Here are ways you can help them:

- Plant wildflowers in your yard or on your porch.
- Fill a birdbath or other shallow dish with fresh water. Add rocks for bees to land on.
- Make or buy a bee house for the side of your house or porch. They have tubes inside for bees to nest in.
- Leave areas with bare soil in your yard. Leave logs and long stems in your yard. Bees will find nesting places there.



DOGS PANT?

When people get hot, we sweat. It is our body's way of cooling us off. The extra heat goes away with the water when it dries off our skin. When dogs get hot, they cool off by **panting**, or breathing with short, quick breaths. The extra heat goes away with the water when it dries off a dog's wide tongue.

Dogs cannot cool off as easily as people. That is why it is important to never leave a dog in a hot car. The sun's heat gets trapped in cars. A car can become an unsafe place for a dog very quickly! If you see a dog in a hot car, you can help. Tell an adult.




